- **Kingdom Treasure Match Game & Would You Rather:** Kids compared earthly treasures to God's everlasting Kingdom, helping them see that God's Kingdom is more valuable than anything.

What You Can Do at Home:

- Ask your child what they think makes God's Kingdom more valuable than toys, money, or treasures on earth.
- Encourage them to share the "good news" about Jesus with a friend this week—just like telling someone about a hidden treasure.
- Help them look for ways to show they are part of God's Kingdom by loving others, obeying Jesus, and doing good deeds that shine his love.

- When we bring our problems to Jesus, he can help us, forgive us, and make our hearts clean.

Memory Verse:

- "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever."
- Hebrews 13:8, NLT

Activity Highlights:

- Which is Harder? Challenge: Helped kids explore that while healing a body is amazing, forgiving sins is the greatest miracle.
- **Healing Hearts & Bodies Match Game:** Kids learned that Jesus cares about both our outside needs (sickness, injury) and inside needs (hurt feelings, sin).
- **Forgiveness Relay: Drop the Weight:** A hands-on activity showing how Jesus takes away our sins—we don't have to carry them anymore.

What You Can Do at Home:

- Talk to your child about a time they felt hurt on the inside (like being left out or feeling guilty). Remind them that Jesus wants to heal those hurts and forgive sins.
- Encourage your child to talk to Jesus this week when they feel sad, scared, or do something wrong.

- God can use anything we give him—even small things—to help others and show his love.
- Jesus wants us to trust him with what we have and use it to care for others.

Memory Verse:

- "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever."
- Hebrews 13:8, NLT

Activity Highlights:

- **Pass the Basket:** Helped kids see that Jesus can use even small things (like kindness or sharing) to make a big difference.
- **Would You Give It?** game: Encouraged kids to think about what they would give to Jesus to help others.
- **Care Cards:** Kids created encouraging cards to give to someone in need, practicing how they can care for others just like Jesus does.
- **Bible Story with Snack Sharing:** Reinforced the story by letting kids experience how a little can be shared with many.

Memory Verse:

- "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever."
- Hebrews 13:8, NLT

Activity Highlights:

- Would You Rather: Trust Edition: Helped kids think about what it feels like to trust someone in scary or uncertain situations.
- **Floating Faith Experiment:** Used raisins in soda to show how we can rise above fear when we trust Jesus, but sink when we take our eyes off him—just like Peter.
- **Trust Reminder Drawing:** Kids drew situations where they feel scared and added Jesus to the picture to remind them that he is always with them.

- Hebrews 13:8, NLT

Activity Highlights:

- **Object Lesson: The Coin:** Helped kids picture Jesus being both God and human—like a coin with two sides but always one coin.
- Follow the Leader The Mountain Adventure: Kids pretended to follow Jesus up a mountain, imagining how the disciples felt when they saw Jesus shining brightly.
- "Like Us" Sorting Game: Helped kids see what Jesus did as a human (like sleeping, eating, and praying) and what he did as God (like miracles, forgiving sins, and rising from the dead).
- **Jesus Is Both Poster:** Kids created group posters to show how Jesus is the only one who is both fully human and fully God.

What You Can Do at Home:

- Ask your child: What are some ways Jesus is like us? What are some ways he is different?
- Encourage your child to remember that because Jesus was human, he understands how they feel. And because he is God, they can trust him to help them.
- Remind your child that they can "shine like Jesus" this week by being kind, forgiving, and loving—showing others who Jesus is.

Lesson 21: The King Arrives

Key Points:

- The people expected a powerful king to defeat their enemies, but Jesus came as a humble King to rescue them from sin.
- Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a donkey, showing he was the King God promised, but in an unexpected way.
- Jesus saves us not with armies or riches but by giving his life for us on the cross.
- Jesus invites everyone into his forever kingdom, and we can follow him by trusting in him and living like he did.

Activity Highlights:

- This or That The Unexpected King: Helped kids see the difference between what people expected and how Jesus actually came as a humble, servant King.
- **King Comparisons & Bible Verses:** Kids compared what kind of king the people wanted vs. the kind of King Jesus is, using Scripture to see the truth.
- **Invitation to God's Kingdom Craft:** Kids made their own invitations to God's kingdom, helping them remember that Jesus invites everyone to follow him.

What You Can Do at Home:

- Ask your child: What's the difference between the kind of king people wanted and the kind of King Jesus is?
- Talk about ways your family can celebrate Jesus as King every day by showing love, forgiveness, and kindness.
- Encourage your child to share their invitation card with someone at home or a friend, telling them how Jesus invites us into his kingdom.

Lesson 22: Broken Bread, Poured Out Love

Main Idea: The Lord's Supper is a special meal that helps us remember Jesus' sacrifice and look forward to his return.

Key Points:

- Jesus shared a special meal (The Lord's Supper) with his disciples before he went to the cross.
- In the meal, the bread reminds us of Jesus' body given for us, and the cup reminds us of his blood poured out for us.
- The Lord's Supper is not only a way to remember Jesus' love and sacrifice, but also a reminder that he promised to come back and celebrate with us in God's kingdom.
- We can live in hope of Jesus' return by loving others, serving, sharing the Gospel, and following Jesus every day.

Activity Highlights:

- Jesus took the punishment we deserve by dying on the cross. When we trust him, our sins are forgiven, and we are given a new heart and a new life with God.
- The two criminals next to Jesus show that everyone has a choice to trust or reject him.
- Jesus offers forgiveness and eternal life to all who choose to trust in him as Savior and King.

"For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life."

Activity Highlights:

- **Impossible Carry Challenge:** Kids tried carrying more and more items, feeling the burden get heavier—like sin weighing us down.
- **Bridge Illustration:** Kids saw how Jesus' cross makes a bridge between us and God, something we can't do on our own.
- **Salvation Prayer and ABC of Salvation:** Kids were invited to consider personally trusting Jesus as their Savior and understanding how they can respond to his gift.

What You Can Do at Home:

- Ask your child: Why did Jesus have to die for our sins? What does it mean to accept him as Savior?
- Review the **ABC of Salvation** together (Admit, Believe, Choose).

- Because Jesus is alive, we are never alone. We can trust him with our fears, choices, and our whole lives.
- The empty tomb isn't just a past event—it changes everything for us today.

Memory Verse:

"For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life."

Activity Highlights:

- **Power You Can't See:** Kids saw how invisible things (like air) can have real power—just like Jesus' unseen presence is real today.

- We don't fight battles with fists—we fight by trusting God, knowing his truth, living rightly, sharing peace, holding up our faith, and using his Word.

Memory Verse:

"And may you have the power to understand, as all God's people should, how wide, how long, how high, and how deep his love is."

- Ephesians 3:18, NLT

Activity Highlights:

- **Shield of Faith Craft:** Kids made their own shield to remind them to trust Jesus when life gets hard.
- **Armor Match-Up:** Kids connected the armor pieces to Bible heroes, seeing how God helped them stand strong—and how he helps us too.
- **Old vs. New Choices Game:** Kids practiced thinking through how to respond to everyday situations with God's armor.

What You Can Do at Home:
